So much has happened since the last newsletter and there are events on the horizon.

Whixall managed to get on the BBC regional news with the launch of the Meres and Mosses campaign to return the "scrap yard" back to moss and to provide a visitor centre. Now that ownership of the fields on Moss Lane has been acquired works have commenced to clear the drainage ditches. Shropshire Council is pursuing the owners of the rest of the drainage network to ensure the whole system is working correctly. This has taken a long time but hopefully we will see results this year.

The social centre is continuing to provide a pub, albeit on an ad hoc basis and I would like to thank all for their time and effort

This year Remembrance Sunday falls on the 13th November and the service will be at Welsh End Chapel, at 10:45am, followed by laying of the wreath at the war memorial. All are invited to attend and it would be great to see you there. I would like to thank Mr Rob Cadman of Cadstones for his help in replenishing the gravel around the memorial.

Moving on to December we have the ever popular senior citizens' Christmas party on 2_{nd} December at the social centre. This year we are asking everyone to let us know if they are attending as last year was so popular we almost ran out of tables, chairs and food.

Finally the current parish council finishes its 4 year stint in May 2017 and there will be local elections. I would like to thank the current councillors, and those who have recently left, for all their hard work and time in trying to represent the best interests of Whixall.

The Big Conversation...

In response to the financial pressures facing it, Shropshire Council has been exploring ways of delivering services and transferring assets to be operated at a more local level – principally by Parish & Town Councils.

This process is not without its challenges as in most instances it results in the costs falling solely on the particular local community and if we are honest will result in local people (principally in the towns) paying more in Council Tax.

On the positive side, of course if a particular service or facility is valued by a community – it is saved. It gives local control and a say on how and to what extent a service is provided. It can also enable the costs of a service or facility to be reviewed to see if they can be reduced.

The services being talked of through this process are local services such as libraries, leisure centres, swimming pools, local play facilities and open spaces. Principally these are based in the market towns of the county such as Wem and Whitchurch. In the context of Wem, public toilets and local play facilities are already operated by the Town Council and both the swimming pool and Town Hall are successfully operated by local community based Trusts - though they are supported financially by the Town Council. The main discussion in Wem therefore is around the future of Wem library. Obviously residents from Whixall may use these local facilities based in Wem so how will you be affected?

At this stage, residents will continue to benefit from these services irrespective of who provides them. Whether at some future date the Parish Council will be asked to contribute to the cost of running these services remains to be seen.

Decisions by local communities on whether to operate any of these local facilities need to be made by September 2017 with transfer actually taking place from April 2018. There are a lot of discussions to take place and whilst a local service maybe valued by the community it is all going to depend on how much it will cost, what are the liabilities and what will be the impact on local Council Taxpayers!

Would you like to be more involved in looking after some of our special wildlife sites and preserving them for the future enjoyment of the community and our visitors?

There is a little gem of a wildlife site at the Whixall Marl Allotment ("The Marlot"), which has a mixture of wildflower meadows, woodland and small ponds. Its location between the canal and the Mosses Nature Reserve (at Roundthorn Bridge) helps to attract a wide variety of wildlife species. Dragonflies and damselflies, butterflies and moths, birds, small mammals and amphibians, wildflowers, grasses, sedges and reeds – it has the lot, some of which are rare.

The Marlot is common land and in the past has suffered from people dumping all kinds of rubbish. Whixall Parish Council has taken ownership of the site and has been working closely with specialist advisers, task groups and teams of volunteers to restore the area and to gain Local Wildlife Site status. Careful management is needed to ensure that the wildlife continues to thrive.

Currently, a very small band of local people has formed the Marlot Conservation Group and is striving to maintain the site for the benefit of the wildlife and the enjoyment of those who wish to visit it for its peace and tranquillity.

We need more people to help our ageing team of volunteers. Enthusiasm is the key asset, but if you also have practical skills or knowledge to assist with habitat management, then we would love to hear from you. There may also be practical training opportunities for those who want to get involved.

Shropshire Wildlife Trust comes to Moss Lane.

Most of you will now be well aware of the 'Restoring the Marches Mosses' project, part of the Meres and Mosses Landscape Partnership Scheme which has seen a wide variety of events and activities taking place since 2013 with the aim of engaging communities and encouraging people to access this area of countryside. Particularly relevant to Whixall is Shropshire Wildlife Trust's purchase of the old scrap yard and fields in Moss lane. Shropshire Wildlife Trust is awaiting a decision from Shropshire Council on their outline application for new visitor facilities including cafe facilities, to serve boaters and birdwatchers, retail area, WCs, a 10m-high viewing tower, boardwalk access, playscape and 40 space car park at Furber's former breakers yard, Roving Bridge. The Trust has been granted permission for an outline application for the erection of a wooden bird hide and formation of a car park (all matters reserved) at land to the east of Roving Bridge. A lot of these land owners have responded and meetings are taking place to discuss the extents of works that are required which is really positive.

Shropshire Wildlife Trust has contracted the clearance of the ditches which they now own at Moss Lane which was the area of most concern.

Hopefully we will see water being able to drain away more effectively this year and the properties in Moss Lane will not be under threat of flooding.
